

## Pearson Edexcel AS and A level Politics Assessment guidance

The information below explains the precise assessment requirements for each question in all the AS and A level exam papers.

Note – this is an updated version, published in March 2018. The changes affect Paper 9PL01 questions 3(a) and 3(b), and Paper 9PL02 questions 3(a) through to 7(b). The sections 'What content section(s) from the specification will this question assess?' have had extra wording added to improve clarity.

Specimen Paper 2 (a)Evaluate the view that citizens can no longer feel confident that their rights in the UK are secure and established. You must consider this view and the alternative to this view in a balanced way. (b) 'Evaluate the view that for the general public the impact of the media is more significant than policy statements from political parties' You must consider this view and the alternative to this view in a balanced way. Candidates who *do not* refer to specific thinkers from the specification and/or only consider one side cannot achieve beyond Level 2. Specimen Paper 2 (a)To what extent are the views of One Nation conservatives on the economy consistent with those of the New Right?
